





MEET A FRIENDLY NEIGHBOR



Nancy McRae and her husband Howie have lived in Underhill's Pleasant Valley since 1973. Both were originally from MA, met working as engineers at the Westinghouse Defense and Space Center outside Baltimore, and married with a plan to move to VT, where they both had roots. Howie found a position in the wire and cable industry, and Nancy worked in

failure analysis at IBM until their son was born. They happily raised pigs, beef cows, vegetables, and two children!

Nancy's second career was as the "safety lady" at Smugglers' Notch where she administered the workers' comp program and developed programs for employee safety and OSHA compliance.

Summers are spent tending both flower and vegetable gardens. Nancy recounts, "Predators were devouring our produce, so last spring, we hired Workhorse Property Management's Keith DesRoches to install a critter-proof fence. It extends 12" into the ground and bends out 6". There are two rows of electric wire around the outside to deter climbers, powered by a solar battery. Problem solved!"



Nancy heard about the Villages movement in her book group and enthusiastically participated in the planning for Mount Mansfield Villages. Their children live in Colorado and Montana, so a Village was just the plan to allow her and her husband to remain in their Valley home as long as possible. Nancy volunteers to help with the recommended provider program, membership, and as a driver. She and Howie are also members of MMV, and have received assistance to change batteries on the anemometer, water window boxes while away, install a bat box, repair a collapsed bed frame, and more.

7) How far in miles (by the most direct roads) is it from Jericho's southeast corner to its north point?


Approximately 12.5 miles via Leary Road > Nashville Road > Brown's Trace Road > Lee River Road > Rt 15 > Cilley Hill Road.

COOK'S CORNER



Velvet Pumpkin Soup from King Arthur Flour Co.

4 tablespoons butter

3 garlic cloves, minced or chopped

1 large onion, diced

1 1/4 teaspoons curry powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground coriander

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper (or more to taste)

3 cups chicken broth

15-ounce can solid-pack pumpkin (or squash)

1 can (12 ounces) evaporated milk (regular or low fat)

Melt the butter in a large saucepan, and saute the garlic and onions until golden brown. Add the curry powder, salt, coriander, and cayenne pepper; simmer gently for 2 min.

Stir in the broth and simmer, partially covered, for 20 minutes.

Add the pumpkin, stirring until smooth. Add the evaporated milk. Heat over medium heat for 5 minutes; don't allow the soup to boil (a simmer is okay).

In batches, transfer the soup to a blender or food processor & process until very smooth. Or you can use a hand held blender right in the soup pot. Serve hot.

This is the perfect comfort-soup to warm you after a late winter snowshoe or to serve the grandkids after sledding.


