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



COOK'S CORNER

RASPBERRY-RHUBARB CAKE

Submitted by Nancy McRae, MMV Volunteer & Board Member

2 ½ cups diced rhubarb
1 pkg. (3 oz.) raspberry jello
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup (1 stick) margarine, softened
2 eggs
1 teas. vanilla
2 cups flour (+ ½ cup if using frozen rhubarb)
1 teas. baking powder
1 teas. baking soda
½ teas. salt
1 cup (8 oz.) raspberry yogurt
Powdered sugar

Dice rhubarb (if very stringy, pull off some of the strings). Place in a bowl and sprinkle with the dry jello. Mix lightly and set aside.

Cream brown sugar and margarine thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each addition. Add vanilla.

Combine flour, baking powder, soda, and salt. Mix alternately into egg mixture with yogurt, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Stir rhubarb and add to batter. Stir until well combined.

Pour into a greased, floured $12'' \times 7 \frac{1}{2}''$ baking pan or a bundt pan. Bake at 350° for ~ 45 min. Cool completely. Dust with powdered sugar, if desired.

REMEMBER WHEN JERICHO...

Brown's River Maple Products was in a building where Mane Street Stylists is today in Jericho Corners. The building in the photo was destroyed when a truck ran into it.

The Community Building was where the apartment building between Joe's Snack Bar and Mel's store is today. Built in 1929 by Jed Varney to replace his blacksmith shop when the Route 15 covered bridge was replaced and his shop was taken down, then became the community center, then apartments and burned in 1968.





George Woodruff's store was purchased in the 1940s by the Rotunda Brothers, Tom and Joe. Joe's son, Joe, Jr., built the snack bar beside the store in 1950, and the store burned in 1963, along with the old drug store just to the west.


