ENABLE READING

Do you have trouble reading? You can place an audiobook order with the State of Vermont and receive it in the mail.

The **ABLE** Library serves blind Vermonters and anyone with a visual impairment or print, reading, or learning disability. **ABLE** is an acronym that stands for its primary services - **A**udio, **B**raille, **L**arge-print, and **E**lectronic books.



The **ABLE** Library—housed at the Vermont State Library—is a network library for the **National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS)** and connects patrons of all ages to NLS services. It offers a collection of large print and digital talking books featuring all genres, print braille picture books, as well as audio-described DVDs.

Audiobooks are available to anyone who can't use print media, which could include, for example, someone who simply can't hold a book. The service is also available for people who are temporarily unable to use regular print media.

The **ABLE** program provides audio players for no charge to eligible clients as an indefinite loan.

To receive services, which are free to qualifying Vermonters, fill out and submit the **Application for ABLE Library Services**.

PFIZER BOOSTER FOR COVID-19

You can sign up for an appointment to receive a booster shot of the Pfizer vaccine if you received your second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine six months ago or more and are age 65 or older. Booster shots are currently only available for people who received the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.

Because of the expected demand, registration start dates for Health Department clinics are broken up by age groups. Each group can register starting at 8:15 am on the following days:

- 80 years of age and older Friday, September 24
- 75 years of age and older Monday, September 27
- 70 years of age and older Wednesday, September 29
- 65 years of age and older Friday, October 1

You can make your appointment for the Pfizer booster by calling the Vermont Health Department at 855-722-7878, Mon-Fri 8:15 am-4:30 pm and Sat and Sun 10:00 am-3:00 pm OR by accessing your online account at your Vermont COVID 19 Event Portal at **this link**.







COOK'S CORNER

SAUSAGE CABBAGE RICE CASSEROLE

Submitted by Nancy McRae, MMV Board Member

- 1 lb. Breakfast Sausage
- 1 C. Brown Rice, uncooked
- 2 C. Carrot, chopped
- 1 C. Onion, chopped
- 1 C. Celery, chopped
- ½ C. Red or Green Pepper, chopped
- 4 C. Cabbage, chopped
- 2 Apples, medium, pared & chopped
- 1 tsp. Basil, dried
- 2 1/4 C. Chicken broth (low salt)



Cook and drain the sausage and put it aside. Put rice in the bottom of a large casserole dish. Cover with the vegetable, apple, and basil mix. Pour broth over all. Spoon sausage on top.



Bake covered for 60 minutes at 325° or until rice is cooked.

"You can also try sliced and cooked smoked chicken sausage links in place of the breakfast sausage and creole seasoning in place of the dried basil for a tasty variation."

MEET A FRIENDLY NEIGHBOR





REMEMBER WHEN UNDERHILL...



UNDERHILL FLATS POST OFFICE

"Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night..."

Reflections by Gary Irish, Local Historian



Mid-1800s...It is probable that in the early- to mid-1800s, the Underhill Flats Post Office was in the Tower & Oakes store where Henry Oakes was postmaster from 1830 to 1833 followed by John Tower as postmaster from 1834 to 1852. The Tower & Oakes store was located on Park Street between the current United Church of Underhill and the UCU parsonage. This photo shows the building sometime after 1857 when L. Carlton was the proprietor.

Today the original Tower & Oakes store is repurposed as an apartment house and still stands between the church and the parsonage.





1885...From about 1885 to 1896, J.J. Monahan was postmaster, along with being Town Clerk, and the ell on his home housed both the post office and the town clerk's office.

In the photo, you can see one door in the ell, and the other is hidden behind the bush.

The original ell has been removed, but the house remains—across from what was the old Underhill ID school and later Green Mountain Foam (recently demolished).



1896...By 1896 A.C.

Humphrey became postmaster and the post office moved to the "chapel" building north of The First Congregational Church—located behind the trees marked by the red oval in the photo.






The building that was initially the chapel and then the post office was later relocated beside the Methodist church and is today the office of Green Thumb Hydroponics.



1920...When Daisy Mead became postmistress, the post office relocated into her home just north of the Brick Store, likely sometime in the 1920s and 1930s (photo left).





1935...Sometime after 1934, the post office was once again located in the Tower & Oakes building (see also pages 13 & 14)—during the time the store was owned by Frank Simpson.

The post office was accessed through a porch on the south side of the building.







1960...On November 10, 1960, a dedication was held for the new post office building on Route 15.







This building was later home to Countryside Florist and then The Flour Shop bakery after the post office moved to its present location. It is once again slated to become a locally-run bakery sometime in 2022.



Mid-1980s...The United States
Post Office for Underhill Flats was
moved to a new building on Harvest
Run off Park Street in the mid-1980s
and continues to operate out of that
building.


