



HEADS UP! FORKS DOWN

As of January 1, 2022, compostable foodware—plates, cups, and utensils—will no longer be accepted as compost by Chittenden Solid Waste District. They will need to be thrown in the trash when soiled. More information on this change can be viewed here.

However, you can still use compostable bags if you are bringing your scraps to Green Mountain Compost or a CSWD Drop-Off Center—but they must be **BPI Certified** compostable bags from a box with the BPI logo on it. You can also use a paper bag or newspaper to line your compost container.

PUMPKIN-CRANBERRY BUNDT CAKE WITH CREAM CHEESE FILLING

from Eating Well magazine

INGREDIENTS:

6 ounces cream cheese, softened

- 1 and 1/4 cups granulated sugar, divided
- 4 large eggs, divided
- 2 teaspoons ground cardamom, divided
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 and 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 and 1/2 cups whole-wheat pastry flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 (15 ounce) can unseasoned pumpkin puree
- 3/4 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 cup cranberries, thawed if frozen, halved, plus more for garnish



INSTRUCTIONS:

STEP 1

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Coat a 12-cup nonstick Bundt pan with cooking spray.

STEP 2

Beat cream cheese, 1/4 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon cardamom, lemon juice, and vanilla in a small bowl until smooth.

STEP 3

Whisk flours, cinnamon, baking soda, baking powder, salt, and the remaining 1 1/2 teaspoons cardamom in a large bowl. Whisk pumpkin, applesauce, brown sugar, and the remaining 1 cup granulated sugar and 3 eggs in a medium bowl. Add to the flour mixture and mix until just combined. Fold in cranberries.

STEP 4

Pour half the batter into the prepared pan and smooth the top. Spread the cream cheese mixture evenly over the batter. Spoon the remaining batter on top and spread into an even layer.



STEP 5

Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 40 to 50 minutes. Let cool in the pan for 20 minutes. Unmold onto a wire rack and let cool for 20 minutes more before slicing.

Garnish with cranberries, if desired.

MEET A FRIENDLY NEIGHBOR

~ WILLIAM "LIAM" McKONE ~ (aka "BILL")

FROM THE MEXICAN BORDER TO THE CANADIAN

Born and raised on the Mexican border in Texas, I am perhaps the embodiment of a "flatlander blow-in" who has chosen to live in Vermont. Although I never experienced snow until age 18 (saw it rain in Texas though, twice), in all seasons the beauty of our state continues to impress me, along with our community spirit here. Recently I learned of Mount Mansfield Villages (MMV) through the *Cambridge Connections* column that Kathy Johnson has written for many years, and I promptly joined up to add this valuable resource to my life.

Unlike the biographical sketches recently included in the fine MMV newsletter, I live alone, and that creates a different social dynamic and needs. I am pleased to share some basic background and interests in this newsletter in hopes of developing even more contacts in the community.



The US Army provided me the chance to shake the dust of south Texas off my feet when I enlisted at 18 y.o. back in 1955 (you can do the math for my current age...). Following my service in the Army Security Agency where I was trained as a Czechoslovak linguist, I embarked on a career at the National Security Agency after acquiring a degree in Government (before it became "Political Science") at the University

of Texas in Austin. I also acquired a wife and the first of my three children in the process, though only one son, Tim, joined me for the joys of living in Vermont. The family did four years with the Army in Germany, where Tim, my youngest, was born, and he accompanied me for most of my five years at the US Embassy in Ottawa.

For over 60 years, I have done professional translations from Russian, German, Czech, and Slovak into English (please, no patents, poetry, or humor as they are too difficult to translate). Growing up in a bi-lingual environment with Spanish and English helped me to absorb other cultures, and I am currently working on the Irish, one of the five Gaelic languages still existing.



My Irish heritage has always been a significant aspect of my life, reflected in the names of my children and an interest in the history of Ireland. While working for several years at Norwich University, I received a Master of Arts degree in Military History. The combination of the War of the Rebellion (1861-65, commonly called the American Civil War) and the fascinating story of the Vermont leader of the Fenian Brotherhood led me

to write *Vermont's Irish Rebel* in 2014. Captain John Lonergan received a Medal of Honor for gallantry at the battle of Gettysburg and was instrumental in the attacks by the Fenians on Canada in 1866 and 1870. I portray Lonergan, as well as his commanding officer, General Stannard, at reenactments (in proper uniform for the rank and not at the same time). As president of the **Fenian Historical Society**, I welcome anyone with an interest to join us.

Upon retirement from the Department of Defense in 1987, I opened <u>Brewster River Campground</u>, a 20-site campground at my property near Smugglers' Notch which was operated for several years by Tim until I returned due to the Covid pandemic. I will be pleased to offer the scenic campground as a venue for outdoor MMV meetings—to include free camping—in season, which runs mid-May until mid-October. The campground is ideally



suited for a variety of outdoor activities, so let's gather safely to enjoy our MMV community come spring.


An Afternoon with Gary Irish Celebrating the Publication of Volume 3 of the Jericho Town History

At the intersection of the Creek and Browns River, there is a large flat area that, as the region was settled, became a prime locale for a village to develop. But what made this interesting and unusual was that, when the towns of Underhill and Jericho were laid out by Benning Wentworth in 1763, the dividing line between the two towns ran through this plain, and thus through the new village. The Underhill side of the line became Underhill Flats, or just "the Flats", while the Jericho side became Riverside. This led to some interesting situations as the area developed, and how, despite there being no water power available, the village had a robust retail and manufacturing sector.

[Image #1 right] 1869 Beers atlas-Underhill Flats



Shepherd Lutheran Church (left); Brown's Trace (ahead on right, out of sight).




[Image #3 above] Heading East toward Riverside-Flats



BIRTHDAY IN HISTORY

Walter "Walt" Elias Disney

was born on December 5, 1901, in Chicago, Illinois and showed an aptitude for art from an early age. When Walt entered McKinley High School, he did photography,



made drawings for the school paper, and studied cartooning on the side, for he was hopeful of eventually achieving a job as a newspaper cartoonist. His cartoons from the 1920s were so successful that he eventually opened his own

studio, where Mickey Mouse was born. Always looking for bigger and better things, Disney produced the first full-length animated feature in 1937 (<u>Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs</u>), was an early adopter of television, and opened <u>Disneyland in 1955</u>.
