will offer you an insight into the history of our region as we explore various facets of the Irish cause.

Seven Days' reporter K. Kelley writes of his **interview with William "Liam" McKone**, discussing Liam's biography entitled Vermont's Irish Rebel—Captain John Lonergan:

"Lonergan (1837-1902) immigrated to Vermont in 1848 as a famine refugee and member of a rebel family on the run from repression as well as from hunger. He worked with his father in Winooski as a cooper.

Seeking military skills to apply to the cause of Irish freedom, Lonergan in 1862 formed a company of fellow Vermont Irishmen who volunteered to fight the Confederates. Their important contributions to the Union victory at Gettysburg earned Lonergan the Medal of Honor.

McKone said he had no choice but to acquaint contemporary Vermonters with Lonergan's exploits. "He reached out of the grave, grabbed my ankle, and said, 'You've got to tell my story," McKone related. Lonergan is buried in St. Joseph Cemetery in the Old North End.

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



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
REMEMBER WHEN UNDERHILL...

THE BIG POWER SHIFT 1830-1840

The Decline Of North Underhill

From *Town Growth, Town Controversy:* Underhill Meetinghouses to 1840 by Carol C. Wagner

During the mid-1820s, North Underhill had been the largest of the town's three villages, followed in size by the Flats and, lastly, the Center. During the 1830s, this order changed.



The period of 1800 to 1820 saw a tripling of the population with the majority of Underhill residents working homesteads in the western part of town, along Poker Hill Road's irregular and bumpy seven-mile length. The Poker Hill highway was a link in the stage route from Burlington to Derby line and was importantly accorded County Road status. The northern limit of the blossoming 1/2-mile-long hamlet (initially called "Underhill" and later called "North Underhill") on Poker Hill Road was David Birge's tavern acting as a meetinghouse until the first town meetinghouse was built close by in 1807.

With a boom in population in the late 1820s, two other hamlets within the Town grew swiftly—located respectively in the "Flats" area and at the head of the Browns River alluvial plain, the "Center."

Contributing to the enhancement of Flats business opportunities during this time and to the suppression of them in North Underhill was a reduction in north and south through-traffic by way of the Poker Hill highway. Increasingly travelers and teamsters favored the more level Creek Road (the present Route 15), surveyed in 1827, and in 1840 the County Road was permanently transferred there from the old Poker Hill artery.

Reflecting the shift in traffic, North Underhill's historic Birge Tavern closed around 1831 and was succeeded as the town's only public house by one newly opened in William Barney's residence on the highway in the Flats. Age sixty-three in 1831, Barney was an original Underhill settler and perhaps the most highly honored and respected citizen of the town. Although seemingly insignificant, his decision to open his

house to the public may have played a pivotal role in the Flats' fortunes.

Further influenced by the unflagging boosterism of John H. Tower and Henry Oakes, the Flats grew rapidly. By 1840 the Flats had dealt a death blow to venerable North Underhill.

The issue then became—which of the two rising villages, the Flats or the Center, would dominate Underhill.

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"And, I would venture to suggest, **The issue** is still with us!" ~ Penny M., compiler of "MMV News You Can Use"

COOK'S CORNER

BUTTERNUT SQUASH POSOLE

Posole is a Mexican soup seasoned with chili powder and hominy



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds skinless bone-in chicken thighs
- 3 stalks celery, sliced
- 2 medium onions, cut into wedges
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 6 cups reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 2-15 ounce cans white hominy, rinsed and drained
- 1 1/2 pounds butternut squash, peeled, seeded, and cut into chunks
- 3 cups chopped kale or chard

1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

Sliced radishes & lime wedges (optional)

DIRECTIONS:

Step 1

In a Dutch oven or heavy-bottomed pot, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add chicken and cook until browned, 5 to 6 minutes per side. Transfer to a plate. Drain all but 1 tablespoon of drippings from the pot.

Step 2

Add the celery, onion, and garlic to the pot; cook, stirring occasionally, until just tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Stir in the oregano, chili powder, and cumin; cook and stir for 30 seconds.

Step 3

Add the broth, chicken, squash, kale, and hominy to the pot. Bring to boiling, reduce heat to medium, and simmer until the chicken is cooked through and the squash is tender, 18 to 20 minutes.

Step 4

Remove the chicken; cut into cubes. Return the chicken to the pot. Stir in the cilantro, salt, and pepper. Divide among bowls and top with sliced radishes and lime wedges, optional.

Makes 8 to 10 servings.



Penny M. writes:

"Using boneless chicken thighs makes the process a bit simpler. Use less broth if you'd like a more stew-like consistency. I often double the ingredients and freeze the soup in containers for future lunches—hearty and delicious."

Mike Weisel is a retired civil engineer with a degree from the University of New Hampshire, the place where he and his wife, Pat, met back in 1966. Pat says he caught her eye because he was the only guy in the mechanical drawing class who didn't have a plastic pocket protector and a slide rule on his belt! They've now been married for 51 years.

Mike's engineering career took them from southern New Hampshire to Vermont's Connecticut Valley to Colorado for a spell, then finally back to Underhill in 1977, where they bought a piece of land, lived in a tent for the summer, and built their house. Another ten years and it was finally finished! Before retirement in 2014, his Underhill professional resume began with 18



years at an Essex Junction consulting firm and ended with 19 years as the independent Town Engineer for 5 local towns.



Mike and Pat have always been outdoor enthusiasts and have enjoyed a variety of sports—catamaran sailing, windsurfing, skiing, snowboarding, hiking, cycling, tandem cycle touring, and mountain biking—some of which he/they still attempt to participate in, albeit at a more moderate level. Good sense has been known to prevail... Past highlights have included several international tandem tours and two US cross-country tandem tours (yes, they are slow learners!).

Now with plenty of retirement time on his hands, Mike is a board member of the local Brewster River Mountain Bike Club, a member of the Underhill Infrastructure Committee, and a hands-on volunteer for Mount Mansfield Villages, doing handyman tasks as needed. He views MMV as a great way for folks to stay in their homes and yet be able to receive some



assistance with the more troublesome tasks such as things involving ladders and computers! It's a great opportunity for the volunteers, too—they get to apply their respective talents and have an opportunity to meet new neighbors in the process. That sounds like a win-win!


BIRTHDAY IN HISTORY

"The Funniest Woman in the World"



Born Loretta Mary Aiken in Brevard, NC, on March 19, 1894, **Jackie "Moms" Mabley** was an American comedian and one of the most successful **black vaudeville performers**.

She modeled her stage persona loosely on her grandmother, who had been a slave. Wise, clever, and often ribald, Mabley dressed in frumpy clothes and used her deep voice and elastic face (and, in later years, her toothlessness) to great effect.



Raised in poverty and sexually victimized as a youth, she moved to Ohio at age 14 and worked for years on the black vaudeville circuit (aka <u>"The</u> <u>Chitlin' Circuit"</u>). Later she relocated to New York City where she performed at The Savoy and The Cotton Club, <u>appeared on TV</u>, and played at the Apollo Theater more than any other performer in history, earning \$10,000 a week; eventually, she even played Carnegie Hall in 1962. Mabley tackled topics too edgy for many other comics of the era, such as racism, poverty, and sexism.

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
